

The Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products



1. Introduction



The Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products (the Protocol) is an international treaty which aims to eliminate all forms of illicit trade in tobacco products through a package of measures implemented by countries in cooperation with each other.



It is the **first protocol adopted under the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (WHO FCTC)**. It builds on and complements Article 15 of the WHO FCTC, which requires Parties to implement measures to counter illicit trade in tobacco products and to further control the supply chain.

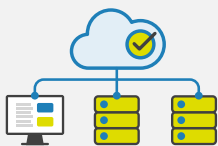

2. General obligations under the Protocol

Article 4 (General obligations)

- ✓ Adopt and implement effective measures to control the supply chain of tobacco, tobacco products and manufacturing equipment;
- ✓ Increase the effectiveness of relevant authorities and services;
- ✓ Adopt measures to facilitate technical assistance, financial support, capacity building, and international cooperation;
- ✓ Cooperate with one another to enhance law enforcement;
- ✓ Cooperate and communicate with IGOs to exchange information.
